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- 1 Pair (see 2 pairs and adapt) (Book 1, pg. 19) Expanded noun phrases

  Cold and hungry, they did not know how much further they had to go.

  Angry and bewildered, he couldn't believe that this was happening to him
- Nouns and pronouns for cohesion and prevent repetition

#### Grammar:

- Noun, which/who/where (Book 1, pg. 31) Relative Clauses

  Cakes, which taste fantastic, are not so good for your health.
- Subordinating conjunctions: while, after, before (not prepositional use)

## Punctuation:

- Simple sentence direct speech: Mum asked, "Are you in for tea?"
- Apostrophes for plural possession: The dogs' leads were hanging on the brass hook near the door.
- Bullet points simple lists
- Rhetorical questions
